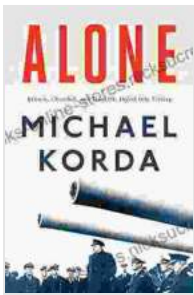


Alone, Britain, Churchill, and Dunkirk: Defeat into Victory

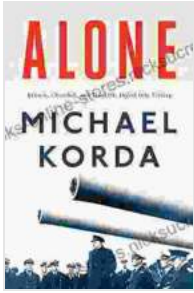
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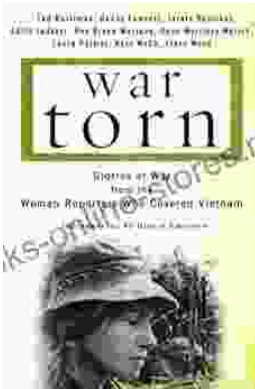
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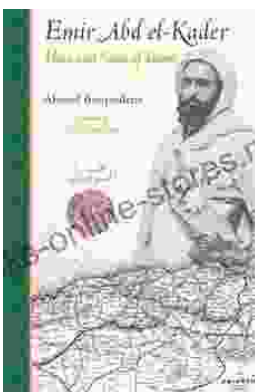
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
