


#### **Venerable Pierre Toussaint**

In 1886, Tolton became the first African American priest ordained in the United States.

Tolton served as a pastor in Illinois and Chicago, where he faced discrimination and prejudice. He died in 1897 and was declared Venerable by Pope John Paul II in 1990. His cause for canonization is still ongoing.

#### **Servant of God Thea Bowman**



known for her powerful storytelling and her ability to connect with people from all walks of life. Bowman died in 1990, and her cause for canonization is still ongoing.


#### **Servant of God Father Patrick Peyton**
