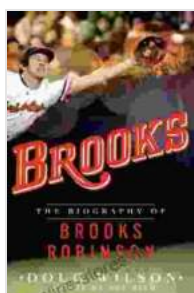


Brooks Robinson: A Baseball Legend

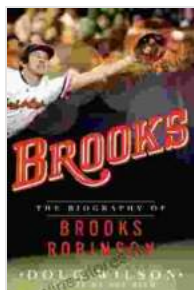

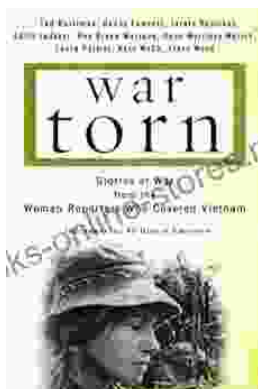

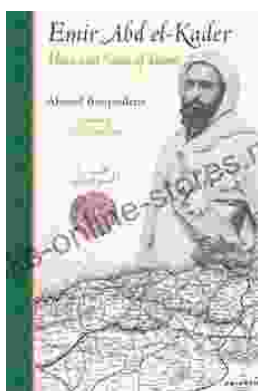
