### **International Success**

In recognition of his exceptional coaching abilities, Evans was selected as head coach of Team Canada for the 1984 Canada Cup tournament. Team Canada captured the gold medal, defeating their archrivals, the Soviet Union, in the final. This triumph marked a significant achievement for Canadian hockey and cemented Evans' status as one of the most respected coaches in the world.

Evans' international coaching resume also includes two World Junior gold medals (1985 and 1988) and a bronze medal at the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano, Japan. His ability to motivate and prepare young players for the international stage was unmatched.

#### Legacy

Ron Evans retired from coaching in 1997, but his legacy continued to grow in the years that followed. He was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in 2001, the Saskatchewan Sports Hall of Fame in 1998, and the Saskatoon Sports Hall of Fame in 1992. In 2000, he was appointed as a Member of the Order of Canada, recognizing his contributions to the sport and to his community.

Beyond his accomplishments on the rink, Evans was a dedicated volunteer who gave back to his hometown in countless ways. He was instrumental in establishing the Saskatoon Blades Booster Club and the Saskatoon Minor Hockey Association. He also served as a board member for the Canadian Hockey Association and the Saskatchewan Hockey Association.
