
Eighteen Months On An Island Working With Troubled Boys: A Teacher's Memoir

Personal Growth


My time on the island was not only a transformative experience for the boys, but it was also a transformative experience for me.

I believe that every child deserves a chance to succeed. I hope that my story will inspire others to work with at-risk youth and to make a difference in their lives.




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
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
