Synopsis

Set in Oldham, England in 1965, *Hangmen* follows Harry Wade (David Morrissey), the former executioner of HMP Wandsworth, who is now

running a pub with his wife Alice (Tracie Bennett). When the death penalty is abolished in the United Kingdom, Harry's life is thrown into turmoil. 


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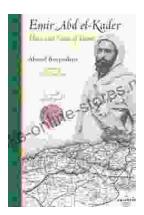
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
