
Early Life and Marriage to JFK



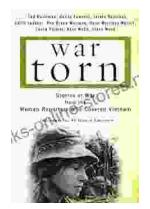

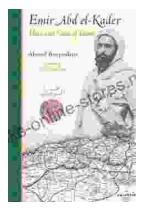
