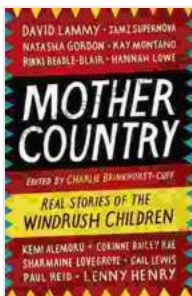


Mother Country: Real Stories of the Windrush Children

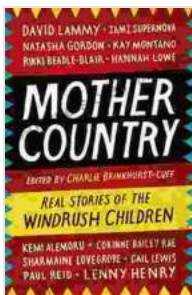

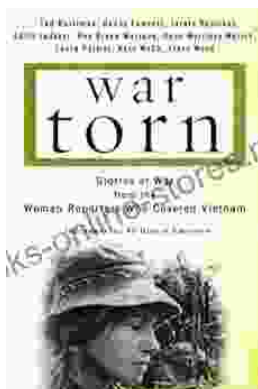

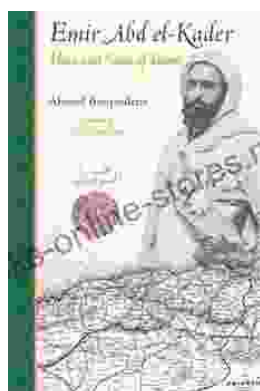
