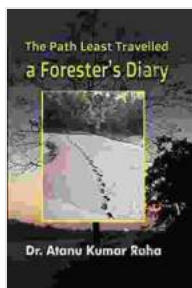

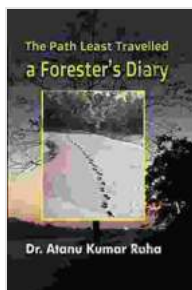
The Beauty of Nature
