

Tragedy on the Indiana Lakeshore: The East Chicago Train Wreck of 1915

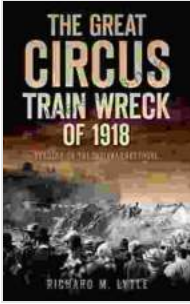

Prelude to Disaster

On June 24, 1915, the New York Central Railroad's train No. 25, known as the "Twentieth Century Limited," was bound for Chicago from New York City. 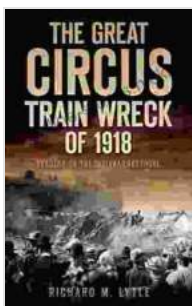
Aftermath and Legacy

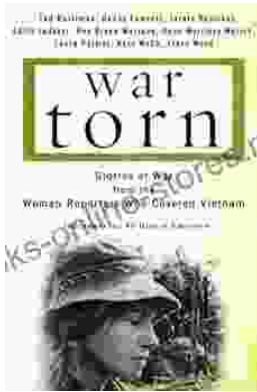


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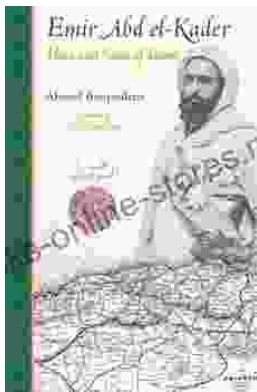
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
